

LOM-Petoskey News Review. R. 46. 22 September 1971. Indians to Defy DNR Order to Obey Rules. DNR Says Will Start Arresting.

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"We are definitely going to continue fishing," Parrish said. "We don't care what the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) says."

The DNR announced Tuesday it would begin next Monday to apply state fishing, hunting and trapping regulations to all Indians with the exception of those in the Keweenaw Bay area covered by an 1854 treaty with the federal government.

The decision was a direct result of a ruling handed down in Ottawa County Circuit Court last Wednesday, directing Indians who fish commercially on the Great Lakes—specifically Lake Michigan—to adhere to state regulations pending the outcome of two suits.

The restraining order was issued by Circuit Judge Raymond L. Smith at the request of the Michigan United Conservation Clubs (MUCC) and the North Ottawa Rod and Gun Club.

Parrish, in a telephone interview, said Smith's ruling "came as a kind of surprise to us. I can't see how any judge would act like that. That's why the whole state of Michigan is in such a mess."

He accused state legislators, Attorney General Frank J. Kelley and "even a few of our judges" of using the Indian fishing issue "as a political football, and a cheap one at that."

Smith's ruling and the subsequent decision by the DNR came as the result of a recent state Supreme Court opinion which said the 1854 treaty did not apply to all Indians in the state, as originally believed by many.

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Parrish said the Bay Mills Council was considering taking the issue to federal court.

"We've been in contact with the solicitor general in Washington and with federal attorneys and I definitely think we can beat them," Parrish said.

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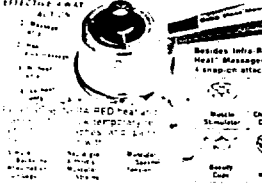

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## Hoffa Backers Say He Was Double-Crossed

bout 400 union members would participate in a demonstration today when Fitzsimmons is supposed to be sworn in as president at national headquarters here.

He said the dissidents planned to demand that Fitzsimmons confirm or deny published speculation that Fitzsimmons met

with government representatives shortly before Hoffa recently was denied parole.

Hoffa subsequently gave up all relationships with the union in what was seen as a bid to better his parole prospects. He had been imprisoned after conviction for jury tampering and mail fraud, and Fitzsimmons was his hand-picked man to

serve as acting president while Hoffa was confined.

"We think Hoffa was double-crossed," Daley said. "Hoffa is a government-labor prisoner."

Daley said the demonstration was intended to force Fitzsimmons to answer the allegations, "for the benefit of all Teamsters."

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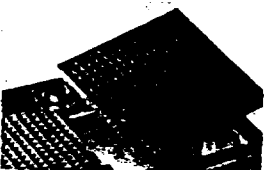
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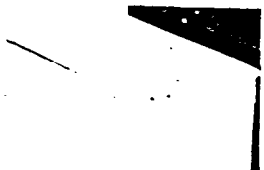
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
