Insurance initiatives on the horizon

ORS is working on several improvements to how we deliver insurance and information to customers. Here's a summary of what's coming up.

State employees drug split. Starting January 1, MedImpact became the prescription drug plan for state, state police, and judges retirees. ORS is updating Clarity so it can capture this information. In the meantime, we have policies and procedures in place to handle requests for the next few months.

State employees Health Reimbursement Accounts (HRA). Some state employees who chose the Personal Healthcare Fund and have terminated their employment got a lump sum amount that exceeds the limits of their 401 (k) and 457 plans. Those employees, and anyone hired after January 1, 2012 with 10 years of service before terminating, will have an HRA with ORS. An HRA is a lot like a Flexible Spending Account (FSA) that you might have through WageWorks. ORS has built a process from the ground up to pay out these claims. Policies, procedures, and forms are in the works and are expected to be ready by the end of March.

Changes to 6-month wait policy. In some cases, retirees must wait 6 months before enrolling in insurances or changing plans. The 6-month wait will no longer apply for retirees who have an administrative disenrollment. That means that they did not choose to cancel their insurances, but were disenrolled by us or by Medicare. This happens most often because the group that administers Medicare, CMS, disenrolls the member, or the member does not respond to a verification of coverage letter. With the new policy, as long as the member notifies us within 30 days and explains the situation, we will re-enroll them the following month.

Stay tuned for more information as we get closer to putting these plans in place.

Fundamentals of Project Management presented by SkillPath Seminars. With case studies, discussion and group activities, they explored the universal major challenges in project management: scope creep, lack of time and resources, and communication. The team learned how to create a clear scope statement, identify project stakeholders, assess project risks, and create a Work Breakdown Structure that identifies subunits or "work packages" of a project.

For many participants, the training was part of their Individual Performance Management goals. Everyone left with tools and ideas that they could put to immediate use.

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PS to conduct records review in April

Obsolete forms, draft documents, old brochures: how long do we have to keep these documents before we can dispose of them?

Process Support owns the ORS records management program and makes sure that records are properly stored and disposed. To do this, PS follows an agency retention and disposal schedule that defines the types of records we have and how long we should keep them before disposal.

The official definition of a public record is "a writing prepared, owned, used, in the possession of, or retained by a public body in the performance of an official function, from the time it is created" (M.C.L. 15.231 - 15.232). In plain English, it means emails, paper files, notes, and even a message scribbled in the margin of a form (see the FOIA article from the [January 25 issue of the LookOut](#)).

PS will be conducting its first full business records review beginning in April to review our records and update the ORS retention and disposal schedules. PS will create an inventory of the records and share it with the BPOs to determine what we need to keep. New agency retention schedules will be created, if needed.

They will look at what it means to be a customer-focused organization, evaluate our current strengths, gaps, and priorities, and ensure that both internal and external customers receive excellent customer service on a consistent basis.

The group also reviewed the insurance initiatives detailed in this week's article (see above). These changes will impact both processing and communication, so CS and CE will be working in tandem to implement the changes.

Christina Sanchez accepted a permanent supervisor position in CS effective March 3. Congratulations, Christina!

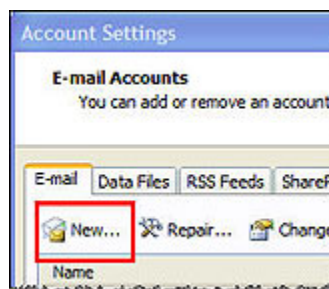
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View additional mailboxes in Outlook 2010

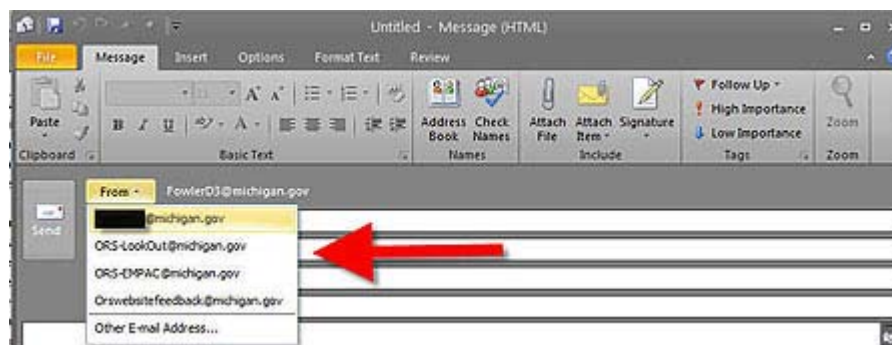
If you need access to a separate email account for a group in ORS, follow these steps to access the additional account through your Outlook mailbox.

- Close Outlook
- On your computer, click **Start > Settings > Control Panel**
- Double click the **Mail** icon then click **Show Profiles**
- Highlight your account and then click **Properties**
- Click **E-mail Accounts > New**



- Choose **Manually configure server settings or additional server types > Next**
- Select **Microsoft Exchange or compatible service > Next**
- Enter **MBX05** for the server
- Enter the name of the mailbox you want to access for the **User Name**

- Uncheck **Use Cached Exchange Mode**
- Click **Check Name > Next > Finish**
- Open Outlook and the new mailbox will appear in the Navigation Pane on the left side. If you have send access, select the source mailbox at the top of a new message.



If you no longer need access to that account, you can remove it by following steps 1 through 5 above, then click **Email Accounts**. Highlight the account then click **Remove**.
