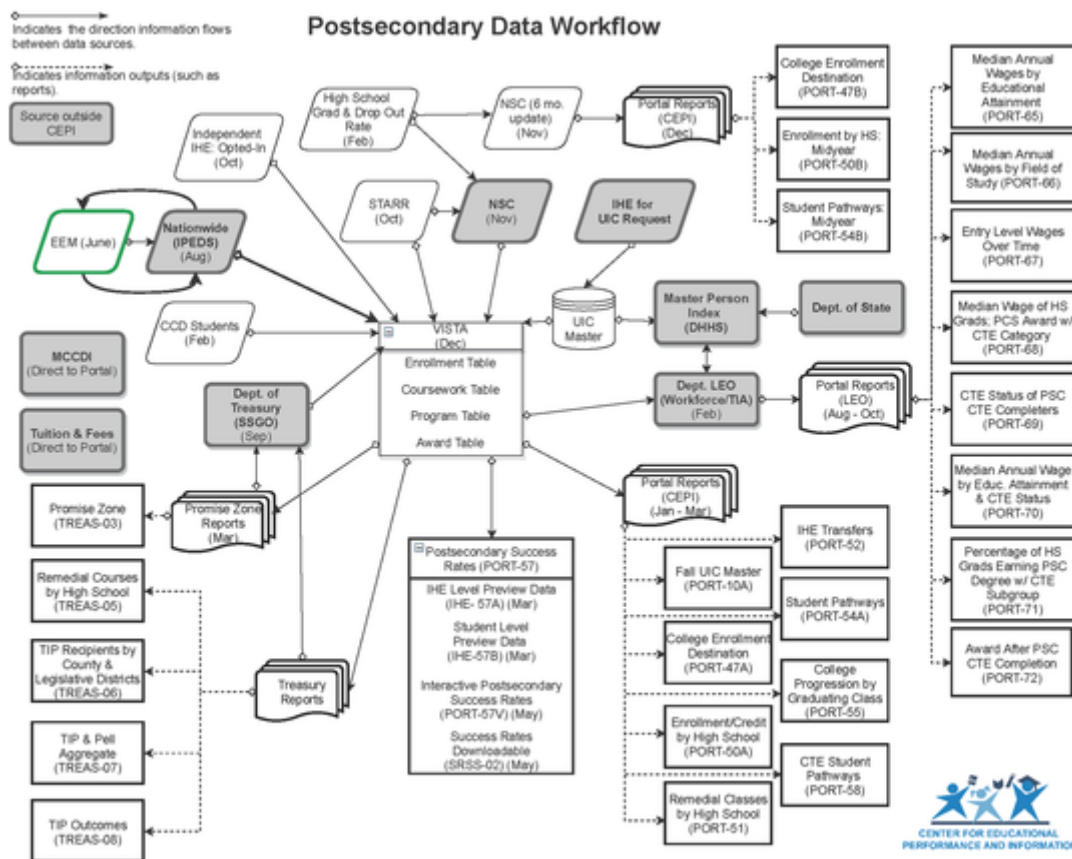

Postsecondary Data Flow



Like [Douglas Adams' description of space](#), the world of postsecondary data is big. "You just won't believe how vastly, hugely, mind-bogglingly big it is. I mean, you may think it's a long way down the road to the chemist's, but that's just peanuts to" postsecondary data.

As shown on the new Postsecondary Data Workflow chart, for postsecondary reporting, CEPI obtains data from multiple sources throughout the year. This includes both internal sources such as the STARR Collection and high school graduation data, as well as external sources like NSC and scholarship data from the Michigan Department of Treasury.

As part of the "backbone" for postsecondary reporting, the LDU creates the "Vista," which is a comprehensive set of views. The Vista incorporates deduplicated data on student enrollments, coursework, programs and awards from STARR and NSC. The Vista is then joined with other data sources to create reports for display on MI School Data and delivery to other State of Michigan departments, colleges, and others.

Heather Handley explained how the Vista got its name. You can see a view outside a window, but a database structure is also referred to as a view. Heather said these postsecondary reporting views are "so humongous and all encompassing that they are more than a view of something; they are like an entire vista." And the name stuck.

Employee Spotlight



A senior reporting analyst on the Longitudinal Data Unit, **Michael Jarema** has been with CEPI for more than seven years.

The first things Chelsey would do if she won millions in the lottery is pay off her student debt, pay for both of her children to attend college or trade school, and pay off her house.

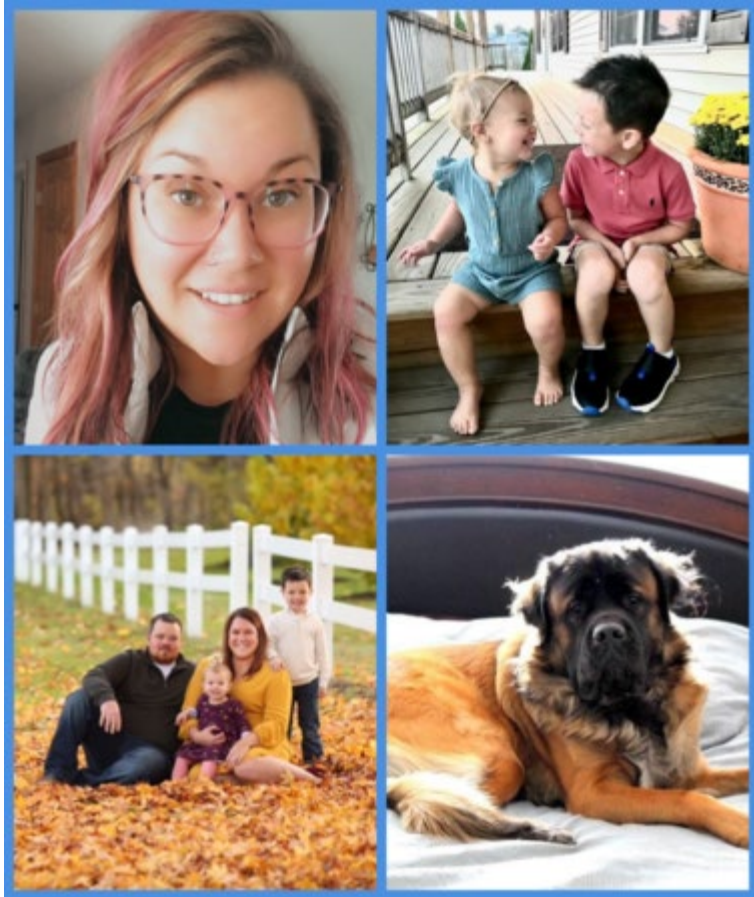
An item from her bucket list is to visit Czechoslovakia.

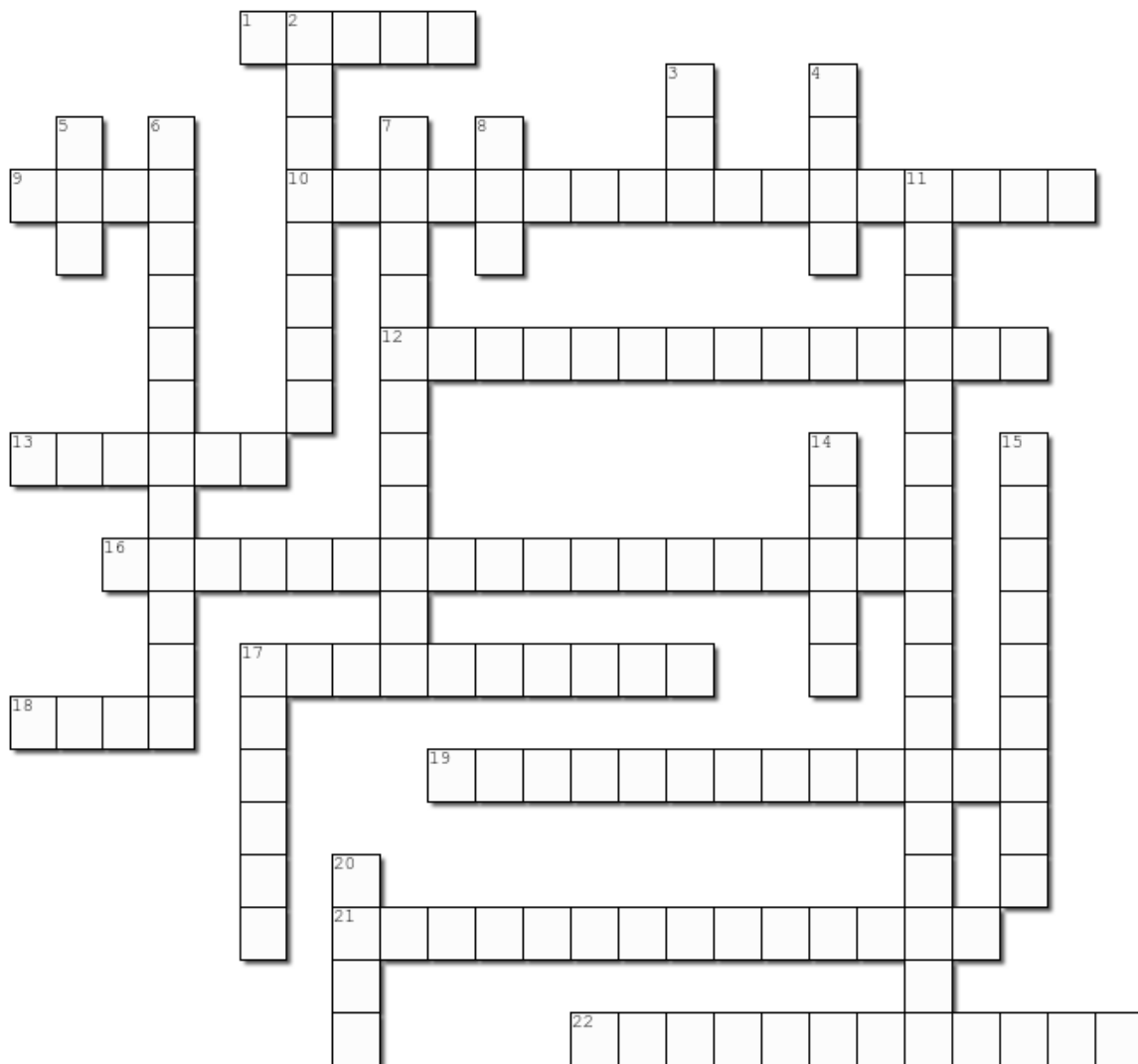


If she could pick a person from history to meet, Chelsey would like to spend time with [Anne Frank](#).
