I have received a petition signed by forty three individuals, residents of this post & vicinity, who are interested in fishing on the Straits of Michigan, detailing my assistance in retaining to them the right and privilege which they have heretofore had, enabling them to fish at the fishing grounds known by the names of Isle Charlevoix and Isle aux Coquilles and its vicinity.

This application is understood to have been made in consequence of your letter of the 5th Oct. 1832 referring to me as regards it. Major Bidwell & General J. H. Sibley give an exclusive privilege to fish at or near the points mentioned. A permit being, as yet, been granted by me to these gentlemen, and as the season of fishing is still distant, I have deemed it proper to refer back the whole subject with the suggestion that a broader scope be given to the power conferred to me, and a sufficient bond be exacted from each person who receives a permit.

Indian Agency MICHILIMACKINAC June 7th 1833.

E. Herring ESQR Com. Ind. Affairs Washington

SIR, I have received a petition signed by sixty three individuals residents of this post & vicinity, who are interested in fishing on the Straits of Michigan, soliciting my "assistance in retaining to them the right and privilege which they have heretofore had enabling them to fish at the fishing grounds known by the names of Isle Epourette and Mille a coquin and its vicinity."

This application is understood to have been made in consequence of your letter of the 27th Decr. 1832 referring to me a request of Messrs Biddle & Drew & Mr Sylvester for an exclusive privilege to fish at, or near the points mentioned. No permit have, as yet been granted by me to these gentlemen, and as the season of fishing is still distant I have deemed it proper to refer back the whole subject, with the suggestion that a broader scope be given to the power conveyed to me, and a sufficient bond be exacted from each person who received a permit.

Sir:

Since the receipt of His Excellency Gov. Portes circular letter dated 30th August 1832. The considerations by which it has been dictated, I have kindly had an opportunity to present, to a party of Ottawas, headed by their chief the wing, and also to a party of the Grand Traverse Chippewa Indians, headed by their principal & boundary chiefs, who called at this office yesterday. The impression that it made on the mind of the Ottawa chief was evidently appreciated, and duly acknowledged with gratitude feelings and regarded with interest.

The wing is a chief who was truly attached to the republican interest during the last war, and has been considered by the Governor at Detroit as worthy the liberality of our Govt. of which he acknowledges also to have experienced under Col. Boyd many unusual instances. He now makes an application for clothing, for eight of his young men & for himself a suit.

Many of the poor and destitute of the Ottawa & Chippewa tribe have applied for clothing, and those truly appear objects worthy of charity. The last of my Tobacco share this day passed and I now wait your further instructions on these executive points.

I would recommend to the prudence of most of the inhabitants of this place, who have made their preparations for the fall fishing, on the North Coast of Lake Michigan from this to mine a coquin, without applying for licenses, In this M^r W^m Drn Biddle & Tom Boyd have let the Escanapaha,
