well the folks are ready to start to town and I must close. I do hope this will find you in good hart and in good health I still remain your trew companion till death be a good boy and live near your god fore you know to him is the place fore real comfort right as soon and often as you can Nan to Mc Ewing good by fore this time Dear Mack
